

Alcohol Breath Test

The BAC Data-Master was taken out of service in early February due to calibration issues thus relying on toxicology results from the Ohio State Crime Lab. A new Intox machine was ordered and will be delivered in 2025.

Bryan Officers continued to make OVI arrests. A total of 24 persons were charged for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence, a reduction of approximately 22% from the previous year.

Patrol Officer John Rathke continued to be successful in fighting the drug epidemic that has affected the City of Bryan and Williams County. The participating agencies are committed to the safety of our community and strive for a drug-free atmosphere for our citizens.


Williams County handled 99 of the 367 cases through the MAN Unit. Patrolman Rathke was a primary officer in 98 cases and was an assisting officer in 45 other cases with various agencies. Williams County conducted 46 search warrants, which included consent to search, device search, and trash pulls. There were 27 overdose cases in Williams County, 173 overall which resulted in 13 deaths.

93 indictments in Williams County resulted in the following charges:



Grants

The Bryan Police Department was awarded over \$83,000 in State and Federal grants that the Chief of Police applied for ranging from body-worn cameras to the bulletproof vest grant. A breakdown is as follows:
